Paper Abstracts

An Introduction to the SAS MACRO Language

Jonas Bilenas, Barclays Bank

This presentation will explore the versatility of the SAS MACRO language to automate code. We will look at MACRO concepts including MACRO VARIABLES, SYSTEM MACRO VARIABLES, MACRO CODE, MACRO LOOPING, capturing statistics into MACRO VARIABLES, some MACRO FUCTIONS (including %STR, %SCAN, %EVAL, %SYSEVALF, %SYSFUNC) and storing MACROS in SASAUTOS and compiled MACRO catalogs.

Jonas Bilenas has been using SAS form more than 30 years in the field of Consumer Risk Management. He has presented at many Local, Regional, and International User Groups and is currently active in the PhilaSUG Executive Committee.



Date with Macros

Alex Chaplin, Bank of America

This presentation will demonstrate the use of macros to easily increment and decrement dates in different date formats for a specified number of months ahead of and prior to a defined start date. This greatly simplifies the extract of data across multiple month ends for multiple runs and facilitates automation of extract processes. Plug in the desired month end start date, the number of months to extract prior and after the start date and whether to append to any previously extracted data.

Mr. Chaplin has been using SAS since 2007. He is a SAS Certified Base and Advanced SAS Programmer. Mr. Chaplin has over 25 years of experience in Information Technology working a range of roles from programmer to technical project manager across a range of industries including travel, manufacturing, chemical, retail and financial in the UK, Spain and the US.

How to Beautify Your Report

Haibin Shu, AccuClin Global

SAS ODS not only makes PROC REPORT output look better but also presents information more effectively. The presenter will demonstrate how to use the commonly-used-features such as text aligning, word wrapping, indenting, pagination etc. based on real examples. The objective of this presentation is to show how these features can be pleasantly applied in daily work.

Haibin Shu is an experienced clinical data professional, a SAS User for over 20 years, and the founding principal of AccuClin Global that passionately supports clinical research programs and regulatory submissions.



Thinking Outside the SAS Box: UNIX ToolsDavid Horvath

What do you do when you get a file that is too large (too wide a record or too many records or both) to easily view? How do you know the CSV or TAB-delimited file really is structured correctly? When you get a fixed format file, how do you figure out what the field at position 468 really looks like (what data it contains)? How do you deal with files that do not read correctly, or worse, break the engine you're using?

There are a number of UNIX/Linux tools to help resolve those issues. Those same tools are also available under Windows with add-ons from Microsoft and other sources. They are included with the MAC OSX operating system!

This session will review a few of these commands including live demos under Windows. These examples come from real life problem solving.

David is an IT Professional who has worked with SAS, since the late 1980's largely as a data manipulation (4GL/ETL) and analysis tool. He has presented at PhilaSUG, SESUG, and, shortly, SGF; he has presented at other user groups and organizations (workshops and seminars) in Australia, France, England, the US, and Canada. His holds a Masters in Organizational Dynamics from UPENN, spent most of his career in consulting, and currently works for a regional bank in Risk Analytics Infrastructure in the Philadelphia area. He has several books to his credit (none SAS-related) and is an Adjunct Instructor covering IT topics.



Rapid Rolling Windows Regressions via Home-Made SSCP

Mark Keintz, Wharton Research Data Services

Although the technique of applying regressions to rolling time windows is common in financial research, SAS® offers no routines for directly performing this analysis. The natural approach to this problem is to create a data set with every window completely populated, succeeded by PROC REG with a BY statement, which can quickly result in a very large dataset and poor performance. However, the ability of PROC REG to accept sums of squares and cross-products (SSCP) removes much of the performance-sapping burden of a large intermediate data set.

The presentation will show how to efficiently generate rolling window SSCP data ready for PROC REG, using the DATA step and PROC EXPAND (part of the SAS/ETS product). Time permitting, we'll also demonstrate how to use PROC FCMP (in BASE SAS) as a substitute for PROC EXPAND.

Mark Keintz has been using SAS® since it was documented in one book.

His interests are largely in development of applications for financial research and education, addressed in several presentations at SAS Global Forums and various regional SAS user groups. Mark's primary SAS expertise is in DATA step programming, Hash programming techniques, efficient use of large data sets, and macro programming.

SAS Tip: Determining the Size of a Data Set

Kirk Paul Lafler, Software Intelligence Corporation

When developing SAS® data sets, program code and/or applications, efficiency is not always given the attention it deserves, particularly in the early phases of development. Since data sizes and system performance can affect a program and/or an application's behavior, SAS users may want to access information about a data set's content and size. To access, for example, how much disk space a data set is using, users can make a few calculations and/or learn how to access metadata content to obtain the information to this important information. This tip explores a few ways to determine, or estimate, the size of a data set – a question many users are curious about when discussing SAS performance and tuning techniques.

Using PROC SQL and DICTIONARY.TABLES

The SAS System collects valuable information (known as "metadata") about all known SAS libraries, data sets (tables), catalogs, indexes, macros, system options, views and a collection of other "read-only" tables called Dictionary tables and SASHELP views. One specific Dictionary table, TABLES, and its SASHELP view equivalent, VTABLE, contains details about a SAS session's data sets. In the following PROC SQL code, the specification of a PROC SQL SELECT-clause is illustrated to access the contents of four columns found in the TABLES Dictionary table, specifically LIBNAME, MEMNAME, MEMTYPE and FILESIZE to display the size of the CARS data set.

PROC SQL and Dictionary. TABLES:

Analysis:

As shown in the results, above, the CARS data set filesize is 192KB. **Note:** When the SIZEKMG. format is specified in a format= option, SAS determines whether to apply **KB** for kilobytes, **MB** for megabytes, or **GB** for gigabytes; and divides the numeric filesize value by one of the following values:

KB 1024 MB 1048576 GB 1073741824

Using PROC PRINT and SASHELP.VTABLE

In the next example, the specification of a PROC PRINT is illustrated to access the contents of three columns found in the VTABLE SASHELP view, specifically LIBNAME, MEMNAME and FILESIZE to display the size of the CARS data set.


Using DATA _NULL_, SASHELP.VEXTFL and CALL SYMPUTX

In the final example, a DATA _NULL_ is illustrated to access the contents of the VEXTFL SASHELP view with a FILENAME statement. An assignment statement is specified to calculate the FILESIZE value for the size of the CARS data set. The CALL SYMPUTX left justifies and trims the trailing blanks from the numeric FILESIZE value of 196608.
